

THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER

First Reading: Acts 3:13-15, 17-19

Peter reminds the people that they allowed Jesus to be killed, and preferred to allow a murderer to be released. But God raised him from the dead as had been prophesied. Therefore, all people should believe and turn to God, that their sins might be forgiven.

Second Reading: 1 John 2:1-5a

Jesus was offered up for the sins of the world. The only way to prove true faith in him, is to honor his commandments. Anyone who claims to believe, yet does not keep his word, does not truly believe.

Gospel: Luke 24:35-48

Jesus appeared to two disciples, though at first they feared he was a ghost. Jesus ate with them to prove he was not a ghost. He explained that he had fulfilled the prophets words about him. He also explained that in his name they must preach doing penance for the forgiveness of sins.

Third Sunday of Easter April 18, 2021

"The two disciples recounted what had taken place on the way and how Jesus was made known to them in the breaking of the bread. While they were still speaking about this, he stood in their midst and said to them, 'Peace be with you.' But they were startled and terrified for they thought they were seeing a ghost. Then he said to them, 'Why are you troubled?' And why do questions arise in your hearts?"

The Easter appearances of the Lord were certainly reassuring moments as the once fear filled apostles struggled to sort out all that transpired. St. Luke continues by saying, 'they were incredulous for joy and were amazed.' What an exchange of emotions, 'startled', 'terrified', 'amazed' – as He stood in their midst.

The Lord is present to me today, with all our difficulties of pandemic, devastating storms and indifference of so many. He wishes to reveal Himself and reassure us that when He is present fear flees and His peace comes.


Wedding Anniversary Mass

Message from the Bishop

The Fraternité Notre Dame Community, since its acquisition of the former Saint Mary of the Assumption Parish complex in South Scranton, Pennsylvania in 2020, has generously provided support to the poor, particularly during the course of the current health crisis. The Community, however, describes itself as a Traditional Catholic Religious Order that is not in union with the Pope. As such, it is not a legitimate religious order of the Catholic Church.

The faithful of the Diocese of Scranton should not attend Masses nor receive the sacraments provided by the Fraternité Notre Dame Community when Masses are available in nearby Churches of the Diocese. Particularly regarding the sacraments of Confirmation and Marriage, these celebrations would not only be illicit, but also invalid.

Each year at the Easter Vigil, Catholic Churches around the world light the Paschal Candle. The candles vary in size and design, but every Paschal Candle has the same symbols that remind us that Christ is the Light of the World.



The Candle

The candle is made of pure beeswax, to remind us that Jesus is sinless.



The Alpha and Omega

Alpha and Omega - the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet symbolize that God is the beginning of all things and will be, at the end.



Not for Easter Only

The Paschal candle is lighted each day during Mass throughout the Easter season. It is also lit at Baptisms and funerals.





Current Year

Reminds us that Christ is with us now. But also, that He has been, and will be throughout time with those who gather around the Paschal candle.



The Cross

The cross reminds us that Christ is the center of our lives.



Incense Nails

Five grains of incense (encased in wax) to be "nails" remind us of both the five wounds of Christ and the anointing of Jesus's body before being placed in the tomb.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24 hour Child Abuse hotline (Childline) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator, Mary B Pacuska at 570-862-7551


